Proposed amendment to Regulation G1.c

a. At its last meeting the Council discussed the possibility of allowing dogs of 12 weeks to be entered not for competition at obedience shows. The Council was in agreement with the suggestion and Mrs Allen was requested to submit a proposal.

The Council is requested to consider the proposed amendment to the above regulation:

Regulation G1.c

TO:

c. Only dogs of six calendar months of age and over are eligible for competition at Kennel Club licensed obedience shows. However, show organisers may accept Not for Competition entries at their discretion. Dogs four months and over are eligible to enter Not For Competition. Dogs 12 weeks and over are eligible to enter Not for Competition.

Proposed amendment to Regulations G15 and G33j & G33k

b. Mrs Garner and Mr Mitchell would like the Council to consider removing the stipulation that an exhibit must not have lost more than 15 points out of 230 to be awarded the Obedience Certificate.

Regulation G15

TO:

- a. The Kennel Club will offer an Obedience Certificate (Dog) and an Obedience Certificate (Bitch) for winners of first prizes in Class C Dog and Class C Bitch at a championship show, provided that the exhibits do not lose more than 15 points out of 230, and provided also that the classes are open to all breeds eligible dogs.
- b. Where an Obedience Certificate has been awarded a Jjudges must also award a Reserve Best of Sex (Reserve Obedience Certificate) subject to Regulation G33.j.

Regulation G33j & G33k

TO:

j. In classes with 40-20 or less entries the award of 1st place, Obedience Certificate (OC) and Reserve Best of Sex (Reserve Obedience Certificate, ROC) may be withheld if in the opinion of the judge the standard of work does not merit the award. If the Obedience Certificate is withheld, then the Reserve Obedience Certificate cannot be awarded. (This sub-paragraph also applies does not apply to Championship Class C).

k. A judge of Championship Class C must record each dog awarded 215 points or more the top six highest placed dogs in the judging book. The show secretary will record these in the official marked catalogue. (Insertion in bold. Deletion struck through)

#### Rationale

Currently, in order to be awarded an Obedience Certificate, exhibits must not lose more than 15 points from the total of 230 points available. This regulation was installed well over 30 years ago, as a way of maintaining a standard for achieving this award. It was originally set at 10 points but increased to 15 over 25 years ago. The belief is this no longer accomplishes what was originally intended. Scores within Championship Class C, where every error is being marked, appear to be frequently close to and indeed over the 15 points, especially at Crufts where a longer, more complex test is usually set. This is despite there being a high standard of exhibits within the class, some of whom are multiple obedience certificates winners and may well be the best on the day, for the conditions and test set.

Removing the 15 point regulation would also mean judges are free to mark as they see fit and differentiate accordingly. It would remove the concern of not having a team with less than 15 points lost and not being able to award the Obedience Certificate and Reserve Obedience Certificate, at the end of the class.

However, in order to ensure a high standard is maintained, especially when there is a small entry, judges must have a means of withholding the OC and Reserve OC. The proposal is to utilise regulation G33j which currently controls the awarding of first place where there are 10 or less entries. The intention is to change this to read that where there are 20 or less entries the Obedience Certificates may be withheld if in the opinion of the judge the standard of work does not merit the award. Thus, if the OC is withheld then the Reserve OC will also be withheld.

The proposal is also suggesting, for consistency, that the 20 or less also applies to first place in any class. The rationale being there are very few examples where there are 10 or less entries where the current regulation can be applied. Increasing to 20 or less would protect the quality of the winner, if the first place was awarded, especially if, for example, there had been several training rounds within the 20. This remains at the discretion of the judge on the day.

There is also a need to update G33k, if the 215 points is removed, for which it would seem good practice to record the six highest placed dogs.

#### Mrs L Turner

Renaming to 'Competitive Obedience'

Mrs Turner would like the Council to discuss asking for the name of the discipline to be changed to 'competitive obedience'.

#### Rationale

I would like the Council to consider the use of the word 'obedience' regarding our discipline.

I discovered when contacting the clubs in the South/SouthWest that, apart from those that said they definitely do not do obedience, many thought they did. However, upon further investigation I found they do not teach competitive obedience but one of the other disciplines. These ranged from pet training to any of the other activities.

We all know that obedience is the corner stone for all dog activities. A dog and handler having learnt the basic requirements for a dog to be a valued pet and member of society may then move on to a more structured set of requirements to enter the world of competitive dog activity. We have Rally, Agility, Good Citizens, Working Trials and Heelwork To Music clearly recognized and understood as standalone activities.

The recent survey carried out by The Kennel Club and shared with the Council refers to our discipline as obedience throughout and explains on the first page that there was some misunderstanding regarding that activity as some people thought any training was obedience. The Kennel Club website also refers to competitive obedience as obedience in the first and second instance.

The Kennel Club Year Book G Regulations refer to our activity as obedience as does the regulation booklet which most participants use.

We know we do competitive obedience, which is a particular set of actions unlike the other dog activities, but we are still referred to as the basic obedience that all disciplines undertake with their puppies.

I request that we ask The Kennel Club and all parties involved to refer to our discipline as competitive obedience going forward.
